To our Parents, Caregivers and Whānau

We welcome the newest members to our school. I trust these families and students have experienced the manaakitanga of Coastal Taranaki School. Your addition to our local Area School and community is valued by us all.

As we reach the midway through Term 3, the winter elements are starting to show with members of our school community becoming unwell and a significant number of wet days which can be challenging for our young people who need to get outside and get active. However, I can say that we have experienced two really good weeks of teaching and learning since our last newsletter.

Teachers have been following up with whānau who were unable to attend the recent Interviews to discuss mid-year reporting. Whanaungatanga – Collaboration with our parent community is of value to us as we aim to see all of our students thriving.

The inter-school and regional sporting competitions has been a continually changing landscape in response to the changes to COVID levels. We do our best to keep in good communication with you and make decisions that put the safety and well-being of our tamariki at the heart of this.

Karl from Kelly Sports has been delivering the skills4life programme this term to our junior and intermediate classes. Our students have had the opportunity to practice their ball skills in a variety of settings across a number of sports. Karl has placed a large emphasis on student physical literacy and has implemented coordination, running mechanics and hand-eye coordination into his sessions. We look forward to Karl finishing the term with us & fingers crossed he will be able to return to CTS for term 4.

The senior school enjoyed the opportunity to view the Project Based Learning presentations last week. PBL was interrupted by the lockdown and we delayed returning to PBL when we returned to site. Instead, we used the time to provide mentoring and support in the key curriculum areas as programmes were affected by their delivery through Distance Learning. This term we re-engaged our PBL teams and completed the initial projects. PBL is our opportunity for students to have more ownership and decision making in relation to their learning. It is a space in our timetable to deliberately focus on the development of Key Competencies which are; thinking, using language, symbols and text, managing self, relating to others, participating and contributing.

Lastly, a review of our junior school uniform has commenced which is being facilitated by a delegation of our schools Board, Teacher and Parent members. So, look out for the opportunity to engage in the consultation. We are really pleased with the outcome of our senior school uniform review and appreciate the support of our families with sending your children to school in correct uniform.

TRADES ACADEMY

Introduction to Trades Academy

In the Taranaki Trades Academy you come to WITT at least one day a week over several terms and gain NCEA credits. The learning takes place in a practical and hands-on environment using industry standard equipment and technology relevant to your chosen career path. Develop the foundation skills needed to progress to further study opportunities or move directly into employment.

Designed for:

Secondary school students studying towards NCEA Level 1 or 2. Students should have a genuine interest in a particular vocational pathway.

What's next?

3+2 or full-time tertiary study.

Benefits:

- A head start on a Trades career while still at school and while achieving credits towards NCEA
- Experience the outside world but maintain the security of school
- A fees-free tertiary education
- Free transport provided
- Study at WITT 1-2 days per week (depending on programme)
- More choices for students to include Vocational Pathways in their range of study options
- Gain work experience – links with local industry
- "Work-ready" young people

Students must attend an interview and create a personal education plan.

All courses are run at the New Plymouth campus unless specifically stated. Programmes are subject to change.

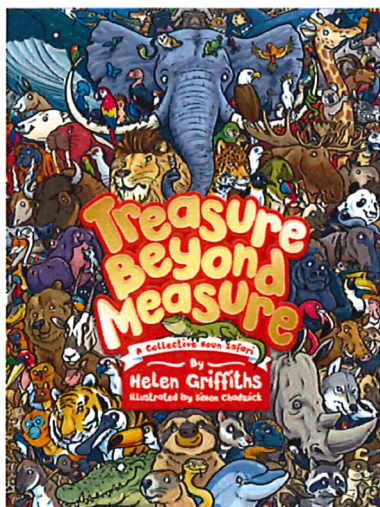
SHINEGIRLS

2020 UNIFORM GUIDELINES

Summer uniform - TERM 1 and 4

Year 0 - Year 8 - Navy shorts or skirts, turquoise school polo shirt, black sandals with a strap around. Black shoes with black or navy socks may also be worn.

Year 9 - Year 13 - School navy polo shirt, black Canterbury pants, black cargo shorts, black skirts, black sandals or shoes with black socks.

Winter uniform - TERM 2 and 3

As above plus:

Year 0 - Year 8 plain black or navy socks and black shoes, navy footed-tights or stockings, plain navy scarf with school uniform (as outlined above).

Year 9 - Year 13 - Soft shell jacket and hoodie (order from the office), plain black socks and black shoes, black footed-tights or stockings, plain navy scarf with school uniform (as outlined above).

NB: Year 7 and Year 8 - As above but can wear school hoodie and Canterbury pants.

Uniforms must always be neat, tidy and clean. All articles of clothing should be clearly named. All uniforms can be purchased from the school office.

2. Hair - should be neatly groomed, some colouration is acceptable .i.e. No full head of overtly bright (NEON) colour. While preferably black or navy, hair ties can be any colour but no scrunchies Jojo Siwa big bows please.

Boys need to be either clean shaven or facial hair must be well groomed.

3. Hats - Sun hats of any colour can be worn but during summer they need to be sunsafe, preferably these will have wide brims.

4. Shoes or sandals - No slides/scuffs for Health & Safety reasons. **No white soled shoes or labelled sneakers (i.e. white Nike ticks).**

5. Makeup & Nail Polish - Subtle, natural style (i.e. no bright red lips, black eyes) can be worn. Natural, clear, nude colours are acceptable. No coloured nail polish.

6. Jewellery should be kept to a minimum - gold/silver studs or sleeper earrings, rings. Necklaces and bracelets worn only for cultural or medical reasons.

7. Piercings should be small and discrete.

8. Specialist areas - Protective clothing, covered shoes and hair tied back as directed must be worn in specialist areas (NB: expectations may vary according to the safety requirements in the teaching space).

9. PE - Students are required to wear a complete change of clothes for all Physical Education activities. Students can wear their own suitable PE kit. E.g. shorts and a t-shirt, any type of trainers and socks.

10. Sports Teams - Regulation sport uniform (available from coaches) must be worn for all matches. Sports team hoodies are NOT to be worn around school when not participating in sporting activities.

11. Swimming - own swimwear and towel. No swimming cap is required but sunhat should be taken to the pool. Goggles are optional, bring your own.

Any continuous breach of the uniform code will be managed by a member of the Leadership Team. Younger students' parents will be contacted and encouraged to follow uniform procedure.
